Vice President's Message



Dear Members,

We concluded our trip to Washington DC late Thursday, June 22, with Elizabeth Hill facilitating direct in person and zoom meetings with 11 different individuals and departments within the USDA.

The good news is that ARS and A.P.H.I.S. are taking the tropilaelaps mite threat seriously. Dr. Ramsey has received more funding to study this terminator level parasite at its current home versus when it arrives here in the US.

Continued pressure to open the Canadian border to US packages is one of our better defenses as it could reduce imports from south of the equator.

Rep. Kelly Armstrong has a bill called the HIVE act. Yes, it's an acronym, to get FDA to legally define honey so we have a standing against manufactured honey - which is now a real thing. These manufacturers want to use the good name of honey to sell this synthetic concoction.

This is a big deal, as it will aid in a race to the bottom on honey pricing for us as producers.

We are working on letters which we will ask you to download, put into your own words (please omit your favorite swear words!) and then forward to your congressional leaders in support of this bill and other important issues.

Here's an interesting observation: An intern was scrambling to answer the phone as we entered the office of a congressman when he pulled up short and let it ring. He said that number was flagged due to foul and abusive language used by the caller to the office. Note to self: don't call and lobby when your fired up. They will tag you.

All in all, it was a good visit. Fran Boyd and President Dan Winter did a great job covering the issues. Good questions were asked of us and we left each session having learned a bit better how Washington works, and how it fails to work. We specifically asked for \$9M to prepare against the arrival of the tropilaelaps mite. This is a huge ask, as funding to most programs has or will be cut by three percent. ARS labs so far are being funded at last year's budgeted levels, which is a win. Our purpose is to have the American Beekeeping Federation front and center, of issues affecting your livelihood or passion. Thank you for your support and interest in making it work.

Legislative Updates

HIVE Act

Congress Armstrong (R-ND) introduced the HIVE Act (HR 4764) earlier this month. The HIVE Act would:

- Require the Food and Drug Administration to establish a standard of identity for honey and report to Congress on enforcement actions taken against adulterated and/or misbranded honey. Currently, there is no standard definition of honey.
- Update the existing US Department of Agriculture country of origin requirements to reorganize labeling to show countries of origin listed in order of predominance (this change is a consumer-familiar update that reflects existing ingredient labeling standards and would help consumers discern where honey originated).

Background:

- Honey is a food product that is frequently adulterated or misbranded.
- As noted by the FDA, some companies mix cheaper sweeteners with authentic honey to lower the cost of production and then sell that product to consumers as "pure honey". Additionally, imports from non-authentic origins, like China, continue to be transshipped through other countries and then falsely sold as honey. While imports have increased, U.S. honey production has steadily declined.
- Despite repeated pressure from both Congress and stakeholders, the FDA has refused to establish a binding standard of identity for honey. This inaction has allowed adulterated product to be misleadingly sold to consumers and has jeopardized the well-being of domestic honey producers.

Clearly defining and labeling honey is essential to:

- Mitigating the import of Chinese-adulterated and transshipped product;
- Ensuring the integrity of the marketplace; and
- Protecting domestic honey producers and the more than \$15 billion worth of US crops pollinated by honeybees each year.

We have been working very closely with his staff for some time on the legislation prior to its introduction. Below is a letter concerning the HIVE Act. It was sent to ALL House Ag staff beyond the initially targeted offices requesting members of Congress (both Democrat and Republican) join Congressman Armstrong in supporting the HIVE Act and add their names as co-sponsors of the legislation.

We encourage all ABF members to contact the agriculture staff in their individual congressman's office and urge them to reach out Congressman Armstrong's office and join as a co-sponsor to the HIVE ACT (HR 4764). All honey producers both large and small should be actively supporting this legislation.

Armstrong Introduces Legislation to Create a Standard of Identity for Honey and Update Labeling Requirements

WASHINGTON –Today, Congressman Kelly Armstrong (R-ND) introduced H.R. 4764, the Honey Identification Verification and Enforcement (HIVE) Act, which would require the creation of a standard of identity for honey and update the labeling requirements for honey. North Dakota is the No.1 honey state, producing approximately [\\$31.2 million pounds](#) in 2022.

“North Dakota produces more honey than any other state. Yet, there is no standard definition of honey. This puts American producers at a disadvantage against disingenuous or fraudulent “honey” imports. The HIVE Act will provide consumers confidence that when they buy a product labeled as honey, it’s actually honey. These updates are commonsense and long overdue,” said Congressman Armstrong.

“The HIVE Act is a good step in the right direction to protect against the influx of diluted, adulterated and misbranded honey imports,” said North Dakota Agriculture Commissioner Doug Goehring. “Consumers will be informed about the honey they buy and our domestic beekeeping industry will have a level playing field against overseas companies.”

The HIVE Act would:

- Require the Food and Drug Administration to finally establish a standard of identity for honey and subsequently report to Congress on enforcement actions taken with respect to adulterated or misbranded honey.
- Reorganize the existing US Department of Agriculture country of origin labeling requirements by utilizing the consumer-familiar ingredient labeling criteria.

Countries of origin would be listed in order of predominance, allowing the consumer to discern the origin of blended honey.

THUD Bill

The Senate THUD Bill mentions Pollinator Friendly Practices. Included in Senate THUD Appropriations Bill, Page 47, Lines 7-10: “\$3,000,000 shall be to carry out the Pollinator-Friendly Practices on Roadsides and Highway Rights-of-Way Program under section 332 of title 23, United States Code;”

Although we are a long way from any final appropriations bills reaching the President’s desk, we want to keep ABF membership updated.

State Delegates Updates

Our latest State Delegates call was held on July 11 and was a huge success as we had the greatest number of delegates so far. Yeah! With over 35 delegates on the call, we met our goal set at our ABF .2023 Conference and Tradeshow. We meet the second Tuesday every other month. The last two meetings in 2023 will be September 12 and November 14.

Our calls feature guest speakers, an open forum for discussion on what ABF is doing for beekeepers and our industry, as well as delegates sharing what is going on in their states. Garrett Slater was our guest speaker on the July call and reviewed the work being done by the Research Committee. He reviewed the Practical Bee Award that is given out each year at the ABF Conference and Tradeshow. This will be the 3rd Practical Bee Award. We hope this award can be used to: 1) Connect beekeepers to the national organization, 2) Fund research and education requirements for the master beekeeping program, and 3) Use their ideas/innovations to help other beekeepers. We are looking to fund four individuals \$500 that have developed a practical beekeeping practice, have a practical beekeeping idea OR needs funding as part of a master beekeeping program.
